

Peter and Hilary Ruxton have been living and working as members of our parish for the last 18 years. Read on to discover more of their life together

Tell us a little about yourselves?

The 'Ruxtons' came to Tonbridge as a family of four - we are now just two - but we soon move to the West Country to become seven! Both Will and Sarah, our children, live in Cheltenham with their partners, Eliza and Tim. Plus, we have a new granddaughter, Imogen, via Sarah and Tim. We are African at heart - the magnetic pull of our family is too strong - we move to the Cotswolds in October this year.

Hilary and I were teenage sweethearts! We met in the youth group of our parents' United Reformed Church, Brighthelm, in Brighton. We then went our separate ways: Hilary to Nottingham and then on to The Bahamas to teach - going west; and Peter, to Leeds University and then Australia as an Exploration Geologist - going both west and east (depending on which way round you go)! We re-met in Cairns, Australia, on the Great Barrier Reef. After a frenetic international relationship,

Tell us a little about your Church life? Initially Peter was on the PCC and a Deputy Warden, before trying to encourage young people via 'Soul Survivor' to lead and excel in the music group. Hilary's focus was always with the young people, and she quickly helped regenerate the Sunday School, then supported SOS and more recently Refresh. She was asked to take on a three-year stint as Church Warden, bringing a different style to the job, the focus on relationship, people-first, mixed with strong encouragement and compassion.

One of our greatest joys has been the growing relationship with our Brothers and Sisters in Kondoa, Tanzania. To be able to empathize and build relationships with those who have nothing materially, yet many things spiritually, has changed our lives. We were immensely privileged to have been able to help introduce a number of young people to Kondoa through three trips over the years. The links we have built as a Parish with Kondoa will never die, but will carry on into the next life; indeed, the eternal link is already established.

Latterly, our faiths have deepened, principally through the Diocesan "Closer" journey with Susanne Carlsson, but also through Parishorganised 'Quiet Days'. We both now journey with the 'Mystics', Peter more formally through an MA in Christian Spirituality at Sarum College, Salisbury.

Tell us about Hilary's artistic talents?

Hilary was born creative, spontaneous and lively – very much like her mother Norma – a mantle that has been taken on by our daughter Sarah (very much from the Wadman gene-pool, not the Ruxton-side!). Hilary began working with stained glass some eight to nine years ago, learning and working through Adult Education in Tonbridge.

She entered the International Stevens Competition in London winning her first commissioned piece, but has also designed and built pieces for homes and businesses, as well as fixing damaged stained-glass windows in our churches!

How do you relax?

For Peter, bird watching, Sky sports, a good movie, a mellow glass of Rioja, and hovering (with intent) over a BBQ.

For Hilary, a hot bath with bubbles (both scented and quaffable), walks in nature, good Film dramas and swimming laps.

The Gulf Stream

A Glass Installation for the Proton Beam Therapy Unit University College Hospital London



This Glass Art work was finally installed last week in the Waiting Room for patients as they undergo treatment for complex cancers - especially children.

This Glass Project began early in 2019, after winning the commission through an International Glass Competition organised by the Worshipful Company of Glaziers in London.

It was my first commercial commission in stained glass, So a very deep plunge into very deep water!

The challenge has been so much more than designing and making glass: hospital site visits, liaising with construction at the NHS, finding and accessing large kilns to take kilos of fused glass, sourcing and transporting large amounts of glass safely, managing a budget, tapping into professional glass advice – and all through the isolation of lockdown.

When the task overwhelmed me all I could say was, 'I can't do this Lord, but You Can – here I am – show me and equip me.'

The most unexpected highlight of almost 3 years' work has been the profound joy in the gift of creativity, quietly working in the home studio, praying and meditating over the construction and ideas – many times it has been the most beautiful place of peace, solitude, trust and growth.

I eagerly await feedback from the Radiography
Department at the London hospital as families and
patients going through the toughest moments of their
lives, sit and wait alongside The Gulf Stream –
a Journey in Nature with a message of Hope.
May God pour on them an abundance
of peace and healing hope.

GIRLGUIDING








In the "olden days" (that means pre-Covid!) when out and about with my Brownie unit or when dashing out the office to get to meetings on time, I would often hear, 'Oh, I used to be a Brownie, I loved it!' The good news is that Brownies, along with all the other sections of Girlguiding, is still thriving in Tonbridge and girls (and leaders) still love it, so why not come and join the fun?!

Girlguiding is the leading charity for girls and young women in the UK, with over 320,000 members supported by over 80,000 amazing volunteers. We give girls and young women a space where they can be themselves, have fun, build great friendships, gain valuable life skills, build their confidence and make a positive difference to their lives and their communities.

In Tonbridge we have active Rainbow (5-7yrs), Brownie (7-10yrs), Guide (10-14yrs) & Ranger (14-18yrs) units. Although we often meet in the various church buildings within the town, we are open to girls and leaders of all faiths or none, from all backgrounds and all abilities.

We know that the lives of girls now are very different from those of earlier generations, and we have changed as their lives have changed. The uniforms are no longer long skirts and widebrimmed hats! In the last 18 months units have even taken to the virtual world of Zoom, and needless to say, the girls were often more cluedup than their leaders, my Brownies frequently reminding me how to adjust the settings.



complete badges, challenges and awards. We've had virtual sleep-overs, Zoom breakfasts, socially-distanced BBQ's, many different ways of meeting, which were all the more important during the pandemic. Promise celebrations were held virtually, badge activities were shared, and we celebrated with two volunteer leaders who completed their Leadership Qualification.

As the new term comes around, how Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers will be able to meet safely remains unclear but one of the oldest Brownie units in the Town – 6th Tonbridge – is reopening after a short pause with new leaders. The many other units across Tonbridge will no doubt be encouraging their girls to plan an exciting and fun term of meetings in whatever format is possible.



Hopes **

High Hopes has links with 35+ schools in the Tonbridge area. In normal times they lead assemblies on a weekly basis in rotation. Their aim is to introduce children to the person of Jesus Christ and His life-changing teaching.

As was the case with many organisations working with the schools, the pandemic prevented in-school visits. With the help of Tonbridge Parish Church, High Hopes purchased new equipment to enable the production of videos to share in class groups as 'bubble worship'.

All material is now accessible via the High Hopes YouTube Channel and has been well received by schools. New schools not previously visited have requested to access the video material for bubble worships and teaching on the recovery curriculum using unchanging Christian truths.

Bishop Given and the Diocese of Kondoa, Tanzania

In this amazing photograph taken in July 2021, Bishop Given and his team celebrate the ordination of eight new clergy, seven of whom have recently graduated from the Kondoa Bible College with a Provincial Certificate in Theology.

A number of these new Pastors were sponsored by folk from the Rochester Diocese. The photo is taken in front of the growing new Kondoa Cathedral – the Cathedral of St. Paul the Evangelist to the

Gentiles. Progress has been phenomenal, with the two-storey building standing out like a beacon for Christianity in the community of Kondoa.

The St. Peter & St. Paul Primary School continues from strength to strength. Principal Conjester has been overseeing the expansion of the school to over a hundred pupils, with a waiting list of a further thirty young hopefuls. Bishop Given and Conjester recently expressed their huge thanks to Tonbridge Parish Church for providing the half-school fee for the year to help parents, pupils and the school to ease through the crisis of the pandemic.

The Langham Partnership

The Langham Partnership equips Christian leaders from around the world to receive formal theological training and serve the church in their home nations. It also trains pastors to preach and teach the Bible and works with local leaders to develop, publish, and distribute biblical resources and books that equip the local churches.

In recent months the use of new technology in training has led to a great increase in the reach of the seminars and preaching clubs,

even to countries previously closed off. Now more than **80 countries** across **5 continents** are reached. In the past year alone 84 Scholars from 44 nations were supported to gain their theological PhDs. Currently Scholars from Egypt, El Salvador, Myanmar, Pakistan, Taiwan, and Japan are studying for PhDs. This would not be possible without the support of library grant scheme, which enables more than **2 million students** to access books and resources per year.

Bishop Barham Trust

Bishop Ken Barham writes:

Let me try and describe the situation in our parish of Nyabigoma, Cyangugu Diocese in Rwanda. The heavy rains of a few months ago caused a massive landslide, which smashed through the school buildings. Nyabigoma was a 'plant' from the parish of Bweyeye. It is in the South of the country, and close to the border with Burundi.



When I took over the Diocese of Cyangugu in 1992, Bweyeye was one of the only three churches that made up the diocese. The pastor there now, Pastor Thomas, was ordained by me in 1995. It was then a three hour journey as we fought our way over rocks and dodgy bridges from Cyangugu town to Bweyeye. In the past 18 months the Government has built a tarmac road through the forest and all the way to the border.

The school at Nyabigoma has now been rebuilt, and the children are back in class - a source of great joy in the parish. We have been able to pay John, the contractor, just over half of the bill for the rebuilding. We are grateful to those who have helped us with donations to cope with the emergency. Thank you! We greatly value your support and your partnership in the gospel in Cyangugu Diocese.

Overseas Mission Fellowship: the Gelsthorpe family, Japan

We live in rural northern Japan where we run a small Japanese church. Sometimes people ask us, "What do you do all day as a missionary?"

Among other ideas we have grand projects like community cafes, Christian Basics Courses, English classes, and video games events. God, in his kindness, uses all of these to build and strengthen relationships, but often he surprises us with what he uses to bring people together.



Last year we bought a table tennis table. So we often asked people, "Do you takyu?" (Do you play table tennis?)

Sometimes a middle-aged man, whilst cutting a serve into the far corner, would talk about what it means to join a church; an older lady would show her skill with backhand whilst getting to know one of our teenagers better; children pour out hundreds of balls and laugh as they bounce them in handfuls off the table.

How encouraging that the work of the church - that is building and growing gospel-centred relationships - can be done whilst playing a game. Did we expect to see God growing his church whilst we get surprisingly good at table tennis? No, but we have learned something important: God can use simple, unexpected things to grow his church.


Almost 30 years after he became one of the founders of Mary's Meals Magnus Macfarlane-Barrow has a wealth of experience in the charity sector.

How Prayer was answered in Canterbury



started with a prayer. Bertha (photo: top left) the new Kentish Queen born in 539 AD had moved to Canterbury from Francia to marry the pagan King Ethelbert. She was a Christian and her father made it a condition of the marriage that his daughter could take her faith with her and also her Bishop who became her chaplain. The King agreed that she could have her freedom to do so, and out of love for her he had a chapel commissioned where she could pray. It was called Martin of Tours (photo top right&bottom) after the Saint who influenced her home town.

Bertha prayed for 17 years for the conversion of her husband and the Anglo Saxon people. Her prayers were answered in an unexpected way and the church of St Martin's, built on the site of the original chapel, is close to Canterbury Cathedral.

Soon after that, in 596, Augustine was sent to England by Pope Gregory the Great to convert the pagan Anglo Saxons. He arrived unexpectedly, possibly at Richborough, where he waited until arrangements could be made for him to have an audience with the king. It had been expected that Augustine would make his base in London or York, but he proceeded to meet the King in Canterbury and this was chosen instead. This city was well placed politically and was the closest to the East

coast giving a good connection with the rest of Europe. The timing was perfect for the Christian message to spread outwards from Canterbury to the rest of England.

There had been Celtic missions, led by Aiden from the North with Irish and Scottish monasteries as a result. This model was predominantly rural and monastic.

Saint Augustine's Roman mission was the first of its kind from the South and his focus was on cities and urban areas. He also sought to bring together the northern and southern approaches, combining active ministry with contemplative prayer, and reach all people, both in cities and the countryside

After initial doubts, King Ethelbert received the Christian message and it is thought that he was baptised by Augustine in the chapel. This was a crucial step to Augustine's success. The King gave his support by giving him the chapel as his base and gifts that enabled the creation of a school and library at the Abbey which for 1000 years was a centre for learning and spirituality.

By December 597, thousands of Anglo Saxons were converted; there was a mass baptism on Christmas Day and the Christian message spread outwards throughout England. Canterbury and its historical sites of the Cathedral, where Augustine was the first Archbishop, St Martin's chapel and St Augustine's Abbey, the original burial place of Anglo Saxon Kings, are now classed as a world heritage site.

Timing for success is crucial: Queen Bertha prayed for 17 years for her husband to believe the

Christian message; Augustine arrived at just the right time for the message to be received and spread throughout England.

This should encourage us not to give up praying and to trust God's timing

to be perfect.
