








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15 years of PERSPECTIVES

We had a wonderful week for Secret Agents at our Holiday Club, which for many years has provided the high point of the summer holidays for countless local Primary School children, and we are thankful that 2023 proved to be another memorable week.

These and other questions continue to exercise us as we explore together a rational understanding of what we believe. Ultimately, we all have to make a decision – does it take more 'faith' to believe the gospel story in the Bible or to believe that we are a cosmic 'accident' with no real purpose beyond our immediate needs and pleasures?

You are always welcome to come and look into these big life issues as we explore them together each week in the light of the Bible in services across our four churches. At the parish church, St Peter & St Paul, we have each Sunday morning our creche, Sunday Club and SOS groups for pre-school and children in years R to 9, plus Refresh in the afternoon for school Years 10 – 13.



15 years of **PERSPECTIVES**

Fifteen years and 60 editions ago, a small group of people met in Tonbridge to discuss the new format of a magazine for the Parish of Tonbridge. Their stated aim was:

... to encourage the 20,000 or so people within our Parish boundaries to think more deeply about their lives and circumstances, to look beyond the everyday and to put their lives in true perspective.



From the beginning the vision was for a publication that would be of a high quality, varied, attractive, thought provoking but with a local focus. It would be created and supported by the church community but not dependent

upon church funds. Instead, it would seek to fund itself through advertising revenues and a suggested donation of £1 per copy from church members (incidentally this is still the same – where else can you still get something for the same price it was in 2008?!).

Rather than being an inwardly focused magazine for the Church community, Perspectives was always intended to be one of the ways in which the church reached out to the local community, with something to appeal to everyone. The initial vision of asking all for $\pounds 1$ was quickly superseded by the idea that each quarter the bulk of the copies would be delivered for free to a quarter of the houses within the Parish.

The magazine has always aimed to cover a good mix of topics including wider perspectives on the world,

local events and charities, children's activities, book reviews, gardening and recipes. Early on readers in the town specifically mentioned that they liked the personal local interviews as it showed the church had ordinary people in the congregation and this feature has remained a popular one.

Did you know that in 2021 The Association for Church Editors awarded Perspectives a Certificate of Excellence for Layout and Design? The award was largely due to the good work of Aneta van Bodegom and Dick Longley who did the graphic design over many years up to 2021, and Jane



Mata, who was editor at the time. The Association recognises that church magazines reach out not only to existing congregations but also to people who live in the community around the church including those who may have attended church in the past but who are unable to come now through infirmity, family or caring commitments.

Perspectives would like to thank sincerely all those that have been involved in any capacity throughout the years, whether that was editing, sharing their stories, writing articles, creating layout, proofreading, contacting advertisers, organising meetings, collecting, sorting or delivering magazines, or in any of the other myriad contributions that have helped to place a copy of Perspectives in each household in our Parish at least once a year for the last 15 years. Do you have a story of what Perspectives has meant to you? We would love to hear it!

Record temperatures in North America, Southern


The warming temperatures are causing drought in

The Healing Power of Love

From the outside All Saints, Tudeley appears to be a fairly unremarkable English country church. The modest stone building with a squat brick

tower, is an unassuming testament to the many generations that have worshipped here for over 1000 years. However, to step inside is to be transported at once into an amazing interplay of colour and light for this is the only church in the world to have all its windows created by the artist Marc Chagall.

So how did an internationally renowned displaced Russian Jewish artist come to design the windows for a small Church in rural Kent? It is a story where deep personal loss intersects with human spirituality and connection.

The transformation of the church was the consequence of the tragic death of a 21 year old girl. In 1963 Sarah Venetia d'Avigdor Goldsmid, the eldest daughter of Sir Henry and Lady d'Avigdor Goldsmid of Somerhill, died in a tragic sailing accident off the coast at Rye. As family and friends struggled

with the terrible grief of such an abrupt and untimely loss, an idea was forming. In the summer of 1961 Sarah and her mother had visited the Chagall exhibition in Paris. They had been entranced by the windows that he had designed for the Hassadah Medical Centre in Jerusalem, dazzlingly realised in glass by Charles Marq. The recollection of this precious memory led Sir Henry to request Chagall to design a memorial window to be set in the church where Sarah had worshipped with her mother and sister. This magnificent window now fills the East wall of the church. In a series of images, we are drawn into the intense drama. At the base of the window, we see the young girl drowned in the dark, swirling waters of the sea, above her a mother tenderly cradles her two small children, while in the righthand corner a woman kneels weeping

in grief. As your eye traverses upwards, a ladder reaches up to the central figure of Christ, arms stretched wide in welcome on the Cross, accompanied by a ministering angel. Chagall described this figure of Christ as one whose presence draws us in, Christ who embodies the healing power of love.



At the dedication of the East window in 1967 Chagall was so happy with the effect that he undertook to prepare designs for the other windows in the church.

Taking inspiration from the descriptions of creation in Genesis he designed the two large golden-hued windows for the south wall and five smaller ones, imbued with blues and purples, for the north. The final four windows were installed in the chancel in 1985, shortly after Chagall's own death at the age of 98. Meditating on the windows will reveal semi-hidden delights: birds with wings outstretched, crescent moons, flowers, donkeys and angels dancing with the movement of the sunlight.

> In the centre of the East window, at the foot of the cross is a figure riding on a red horse, a reoccurring symbol in Chagall's art. When asked about its symbolism Chagall simply replied that "horses are for happiness" and

when pressed further he counselled; "Everyone must choose the symbolism for themselves". Why not take the chance to see this amazing work of art on your doorstep and see what the symbolism will say to you?

The Church is usually open daily to visitors, Monday - Sunday: 9:00am - 4pm in winter, 9:00am - 6pm in summer. "In you alone I have everything"

The Revelations of Julian of Norwich

This year many people around the world will take part in celebrating the life of a woman of the fourteenth century about whom we know next to nothing. Why? Because 650 years ago the woman who we have come to know as Julian of Norwich received a vision of the love of God which would change her life and the life of many others profoundly. These visions were recorded in the first known book authored by a woman in English, the Revelations of Divine Love. This little book has become a spiritual classic, a deep yet simply expressed guide to the way of faith, hope and love.

He did not say, 'You shall not be perturbed, you shall not be troubled, you shall not be distressed', but he said, 'You shall not be overcome.'


In May 1373, at the age of 30, Julian was struck by a severe illness which left her close to death. We know almost nothing about her earlier life but we know that during this period Norwich suffered through episodes of plague and famine. As she lay on what she believed to be her death bed she experienced a series of 16 visions revealing to her aspects of the love of God. Following her recovery, she would spend the rest of her life pondering their meaning and recording her insights.

God, of your goodness, give me yourself; you are enough for me, and anything less that I could ask for would not do you full honour. And if I ask anything that is less, I shall always lack something, but in you alone I have everything.

Julian chose to become an anchoress, walled into a cell, dedicated to a life of prayer and contemplation. In doing so she was in effect choosing to be seen as dead to the world. At the moment of an anchoress' enclosure, the priest would

recite funeral prayers.





Peace and love are always in us, being and working, but we are not always in peace and love. But God wants us to pay attention to this: that he is the foundation of our whole life in love.

Although Julian's life was physically limited to the confines of her cell her influence spread far beyond. We know from another medieval literary work, The Book of Margery Kempe, that in her lifetime many people came to her cell in Norwich to seek spiritual guidance. Interest in Julian's writings has grown in recent times. Her work has been translated into many languages and is well-respected by theologians, historians and literary scholars. In leaving us her Revelations of Divine Love Julian has given us access to the spiritual riches that God gifted her.

"... to whom this book may come, thank our Saviour, Christ Jesus, intently and with all your heart that he vouchsafed these showings and revelations of his endless love, mercy and goodness for you and to you, so as to be your and our safe guide and safe-conduct to everlasting bliss – which may Jesus grant us! Amen."

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Artificial Intelligence

Luke Sage has been coming to the Parish Church for many years and can often be found drumming at 'St Peter and St Paul's Tonbridge' morning services during the holidays. In term time, he is at the University of Bath, where in September he enters his final year studying robotics engineering. His degree is on the forefront of the issues and benefits posed by AI, with some of his professors leading the development and discussions surrounding it.

Artificial Intelligence (or AI) has been much in the news in recent months, usually with negative connotations. I have been asked to write this article to shed some light on the potentially amazing opportunities it invites, alongside addressing the negativity being spread in the media.

So, what is Artificial Intelligence, or AI as it is commonly called? It is basically where a computer program is given a task to perform, and it does so with similar skill to that of a human carrying out the task, including the ability to learn from its surroundings and improve at the task. This can be alarming for people, who fear for their jobs being replaced with robots. But that is just the beginning.

As with any development, AI has the potential to be a force for good and for bad. Much depends on who's using it. Many computer scientists and leading academic minds are recognising this time as another boom in technology, not unlike the invention of the printing press, or the industrial revolution, or the invention of the internet. As with each of these, AI is a tool we all will be able to use to improve lives.

Al opens the door to more accessible knowledge, creating new job opportunities, as well as improving living, education, and healthcare. Some are anxious about the changes to healthcare, which might result, for example, in a malfunction in the middle of surgery. The fact that these might be less likely than human error may not be much consolation. But AI will allow for complex and precision procedures to be handled



more delicately, whilst even freeing up surgeon time to reduce hospital waiting lists. But, as with all good things there is the fear of people exploiting this beneficial tool. As already mentioned, alongside the creation of new jobs, many will inevitably be replaced by

robots using AI, without needing pay increases or rest breaks! There is the risk that individuals or organisations will be able to exploit the system, so online security will need to be improved. It will be vital to keep up with the rising danger AI can impose on our data and banking systems. Many are left wondering what we can do about it? There are also ethical issues about agency: up to what

point do we, as humans, delegate our decisions to our "intelligent devices" – be it in choosing our music, deciding what films we will watch, or more seriously controlling the car in which we travel?

At this stage, one of the most important things we can do is encourage those in power to seek education surrounding AI, and to be quick to develop and apply new laws that limit its capability and protect us from those who seek to do harm with it. AI is often seen as negative in the media, but it can be controlled and put to positive use in day-to-day events, provided safeguards are put in place early on. With the new appointment for the Minister for AI in March, the

government needs to be able to stay on top of these new developments and keep the international discussion ongoing.

All in all, when it comes to AI in the modern world, it is important to remain critical of the positive and of the negative. The media are quick to remind the public of the dangers of AI, whilst regularly ignoring the positives it will bring too. Pandora's box

has already been opened, so it is now up to us to encourage our leaders to put laws in place to protect us from these negative applications and allow the positive applications to thrive in providing future generations with happier, healthier lives.
